Those in attendance included Mr Trevor Watts MP (Member for Toowoomba North), Mayor Geoff McDonald, Bishop Cameron, and faith and community leaders from across the region.

It was a deeply moving and solemn occasion. Prayers were offered by faith leaders, candles were lit, and flowers were laid in remembrance of the victims. In his address, Mayor Geoff McDonald expressed, 'On behalf of the people of the Toowoomba Region, I extend our deepest sympathy to all those affected by this tragedy'.
